JULY - AUGUST IN REVIEW

Partnership, Learning and Community Action

July and August were months of new partnerships, stronger community engagement and continued learning across LBE's programmes.

LBE strengthened its capacity to use evidence and participatory approaches in programming, while PlayMatters 3.0 and the Breaking Children's Barriers to Equitable Education (BBEE) projects opened further opportunities to advance inclusive learning for children and families.

From nutrition demonstrations with parents to the greening of Home Learning Centres with 4,500 fruit tree seedlings, communities continued to demonstrate how locally led solutions can support children to learn and thrive.

Greening Home Learning Centres

What if a tree planted today could support a child's learning, nutrition and community for years to come?

In August, LABE received 4,500 fruit tree seedlings from the Rotary Club (RC) of Kampala Central, in partnership with Roofings Group, to support the greening of Home Learning Centres (HLCs) across Northern Uganda and West Nile.

The mango, avocado and jackfruit seedlings are being distributed to LABE-supported HLCs in Gulu, Nwoya, Yumbe, Adjumani, Koboko, Terego and Obongi, where children, caregivers and communities will take part in planting and caring for them.

The initiative goes beyond making learning spaces greener. Once mature, the trees will provide fruit that can contribute to children's nutrition, while surplus produce can provide an additional source of income. Along the way, children will learn about growing trees and caring for their environment.

“Planting a tree at a Home Learning Centre is also an opportunity to plant the values of care, responsibility and environmental stewardship in a child.”

Expanding Equitable Learning



improve equitable access to quality education for vulnerable children in selected districts in Northern Uganda and West Nile. Under the project, LBE will work with primary schools to promote girls' access to, participation in and retention in education, while engaging families, schools and communities to address barriers that hinder girls' learning and educational progression.

Breaking Children's Barriers to Equitable Education

In July, LBE joined Diakonia, Gulu Women's Economic Development and Globalization (GWED-G) and African Youth Development Link (AYDL) for a collaborative learning and planning session in Gulu. The engagement combined reflection on lessons from joint field monitoring with the inception of the Breaking Children's Barriers to Equitable Education (BBEE) project, funded by Diakonia Sverige.

A New Chapter for Learning through Play

On 25 August, LBE joined government, development partners and education actors in Kampala for the national launch of PlayMatters 3.0.

The new phase builds on evidence from PlayMatters 1.0 and 2.0 and places greater emphasis on strengthening the wider education ecosystem so that Learning through Play can increasingly become part of how teaching and learning happens within Uganda's education system.

LBE is among the national partners contributing to this next chapter and will support implementation in Yumbe District, bringing its experience working with children, families, educators and communities.



Partner Spotlight: LABE's Two-Generation Approach

The [Conrad N. Hilton Foundation](#) highlighted LABE's work supporting refugee children and their families through a two-generation approach.

The Foundation recognised how LABE supports caregivers to run home-based childcare centres, creating opportunities for families to strengthen their livelihoods while young children access safe, nurturing environments where they can learn and play.

MEASURING WHAT MATTERS

Quality early childhood programming requires more than reaching children; it requires understanding how they are growing, developing and responding to the support they receive.

In July, LBE strengthened staff capacity to use the Caregiver-Reported Early Development Instruments (CREDI) and Growth Monitoring tools through a hands-on training facilitated by a team from Tiny Totos in partnership with officials from Yumbe, Koboko and Terego District Local Government Health departments.

Field staff from LBE's seven districts of operation: Yumbe, Adjumani, Terego, Koboko, Obongi, Gulu and Nwoya, strengthened their understanding of how the tools can be used to monitor children's growth and development, generate quality data and inform programming that better responds to the needs of young children and their caregivers.

The engagement reflects LBE's continued investment in building staff capacity and strengthening the use of evidence to inform programme decisions.

FROM LEARNING TO PRACTICE: PAPRO

In August, LBE staff from across field locations converged in Koboko District for training in Participatory Programming (PAPRO).

The training strengthened shared understanding and practical tools around voice, ownership, relevance, trust and sustainability. But the learning did not remain in the training room.

Staff moved into communities at Diobe, Nyeite and Tanyaji HLCs, where they piloted the methodology and facilitated conversations that enabled community members to identify priorities and shape decisions using the principles explored during the training.

For LBE, effective programming begins with listening. Communities are not simply beneficiaries of programmes; their voices and experiences are essential to shaping solutions that are relevant, owned and sustainable.

Learning That Reaches the Household

Putting Nutrition Knowledge into Practice

Good nutrition during pregnancy and early childhood plays an important role in children's growth, development and ability to learn.

Following a parenting session on nutrition, parents from Anguowubo and Alibajiako HLCs in Terego District participated in a practical food demonstration, preparing nutritious meals for pregnant mothers and children aged 0–6 using locally available foods.

Facilitated by a nutritionist from Arua Regional Referral Hospital, the activity enabled parents to translate nutrition information into practical skills they can apply within their households. The demonstrations were also documented for possible adaptation into future parenting materials.

The session ended with a friendly competition, with Alibajiako HLC emerging as the winner, but with both communities taking home practical knowledge to support healthier beginnings for children.

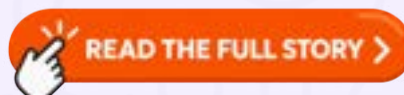
FROM SAVINGS TO OPPORTUNITY: Ngun Gwon Koyi's Road to Success

What happens when savings are matched with knowledge and the confidence to invest?

For members of the Ngun Gwon Koyi Home Learning Centre VSLA in Obongi District, the answer is taking shape through a growing poultry enterprise, household businesses and a new outlook on saving and investing.

Through collective saving and enterprise, members are strengthening their ability to meet household needs while building more secure livelihoods for their families.

Armed with new knowledge in financial management, poultry production, group visioning, and enterprise development, the members decided to invest their savings in poultry farming. They started with 35 Sasso chickens...The impact has extended well beyond the group enterprise.
